Education with Character Curriculum Overview

Character is a set of personal traits or dispositions that produce specific moral emotions, inform motivation, and guide conduct.

Character education includes all explicit and implicit educational activities that help our pupils to develop positive personal strengths called virtues.

Our Character Education Vision

Our Education with Character curriculum vision is to ensure:

- **1.** Each child has a right to character education;
- Character is caught through role-modelling and emotional contagion: committed leadership, school culture and ethos are therefore central:
- Character is taught: direct teaching of character provides the rationale, language and tools to use in developing character elsewhere in and out of school:
- **4.** Character is **sought** freely to pursue a better life;
- Character is educable: it is not fixed and the virtues can be developed
- **6.** Character builds on Virtue Literacy;
- Good character is the foundation for improved attainment, better behaviour and increased employability, but most importantly, flourishing societies;
- **8.** Character is developed in partnership with parents, families, employers, and other community organisations.

The development of character empowers pupils and is liberating.

Our Character Education Principles

Our Education with Character curriculum aims to:

- Promote core ethical values/virtues as the basis of good character:
- Define "character" comprehensively to include thinking, feeling, and behaviour:
- Use a comprehensive, intentional, proactive, and effective approach to character development;
- 4. Create a caring school community;
- 5. Provide pupils with opportunities for moral action;
- Provide a meaningful and challenging academic curriculum that respects all learners, develops their character, and helps them to succeed;
- 7. Strives to foster pupil's self-motivation;
- Engage the school staff as a learning and moral community that shares responsibility for character education;
- Foster shared moral leadership and support of character education:
- Engage families and community members as partners in the character-building effort;
- 11. Evaluate the character of the school, the school staff's functioning as character educators, and the extent to which pupils manifest good character.

Our Character Education Virtues

Our **Education with Character** curriculum aims to develop the following virtues:

Intellectual Virtues

Character traits necessary for discernment, right action and the pursuit of knowledge, truth and understanding.

Moral Virtues

Character traits that enable us to act well in situations that require an ethical response.

Civic Virtues

Character traits that are necessary for engaged responsible citizenship, contributing to the common good.

Performance Virtues

Character traits that have an instrumental value in enabling the intellectual, moral and civic virtues.

Our character virtues are:

Caught... ...through a positive school community, formational relationships, and a clear ethos.

Taught... ...through the curriculum using teaching and learning strategies, activities, and resources.

Sought.... through chosen experiences that occur within and outside of the formal curriculum.


